

President's Message May 2016

Fellow SAACAC Members:

April showers bring May flowers! We finally have had a few much needed April showers. While driving on an overcast day we see the odd vehicle without running lights and some with only one light. Was that truck with one light we met in the morning the same one we met coming home? With the long hours of daylight it is easy to be unaware of headlight malfunction. For those of us driving vintage vehicles, actually remembering to turn lights on during cloudy days is key to not being the exception.

A recent study by the Insurance Institute for Highway Safeway identified that less than half the cars tested acceptable lighting at night. Drivers who thought their eyes didn't do well at night driving may actually be the victims of their own vehicle's substandard lighting. Halogen lights, aside from being distracting for some oncoming traffic, apparently may not give sufficient light for drivers. Though perhaps LED lights may give a better light, headlight aiming, glass cleanliness and scratching also have impact on road vision. Since most accidents occur between dusk and dawn, attention to lighting should be one of the more important maintenance items.

Another considerable risk of dawn to dusk driving is deer on the road. Perhaps a study to see which lights deer can see may be worthwhile. We've armed ourselves with deer whistles and hope there are no hearing-impaired deer out there.

Member's Page - Don and Wanda Bollinger



TC: Tell us a little about yourself Don. Don: I grew up on a ranch outside of Jordan, in eastern Montana. Starting when I was 8 years old, during seeding and busy times on the farm my dad would drive tractor all day, then I would drive the tractor all night. My mom worried about me so she would get up in the night and check out the window to see if she could still see the light moving in the field and know I was all right.

My dad paid cash for everything. During WW11 he put his name in for a John Deere H and for an International M. They were comparable. He waited for some time for a tractor to come in. They were hard to come by in those days. We got mail twice a week. One day my dad was coming home and he went past the mailbox, which was about 3 miles from the ranch. There was a card in the box that said, John we have a Farmall "M" in here with your name on it, and if you still want it you'd better get in here and claim it. This was

November, wintertime. So he went down, got the car out, and drove the 38 miles to Jordan. He bought this tractor for \$1840. That was a lot of money in those days, but you got a lot of tractor. Then he got on that thing and drove all the way home, with no cab, after dark, in 10 below zero temperature. *TC: He probably had to follow a car cause he wouldn't have lights.* Don: Oh no, he had lights. This was a modern tractor! I think most guys would have been cussing about the drive, but not my dad. When he got home he was all smiles! He had waited so long for that tractor. I remember it very plainly.

Wanda: Don's dad was a 'gentle giant'. He treated me so good. Don: My dad married mom, and dad's sister married mom's brother on the same day. That winter they went up to Fort Peck and worked at the dam, and lived in tents! Imagine! They worked not so much on the dam; they built foundations for houses and stuff. They would come home and farm in the summer. They farmed next door to each other. We lived in the "olden days." Our phone was hooked up with wires that ran along the top of the fence posts.

The water always had little flecks of coal. Dad eventually put in a filter system that solved that problem. We had two coalmines on our ranch. We were excited when we got electricity in 1950. But you know, we were happy. We worked hard, and had fun.

TC: Tell us about your life Wanda. Wanda: I grew up in Wolf Creek. My mother was born in the Netherlands. I have loved old cars ever since I was a little girl. We lived in Helena for a time, and there was a drive-in restaurant called Gerties. Gertie had a pink 1955 Ford Thunderbird. I loved that car, and that got me interested in old cars. Don came to Wolf Creek when he was on the engineering crew working on the highway through the Missouri river valley. I was 15 and Don was 21 when we met. So I was 15 years old and I was going down to meet his family. We left after his work. After we got to Jordan, then we turned off onto this little trail. It was miles more. We didn't get there until midnight. I was nervous about this, but his folks were so welcoming to me. Don: About a third of that "little trail" was gumbo. You didn't want to get stuck in there! Wanda: After we were married, living in Wolf Creek, we took a job stacking hay bales in the evenings after Don finished working on the road. The bales would sometimes have rattlesnakes in them. You would stack the bales with snakes in a different stack than the others. The snakes were dead, but they would start to smell. Ed note: yuck! When our second daughter started kindergarten I went to work for Courtesy Ford here in Conrad, and worked for them for 7 years. Then I worked 13 years for an insurance company. Then I went to the Chevrolet Garage and did books for them for about 13 years. I finally quit because it seemed like any time Don wanted to go someplace it would be when payroll was due or something, so I was pretty tied down. A couple of years later they called me and asked me to come back for a time because the girl that replaced me just didn't work out. They finally found someone else and I started to train him. He was an accountant, but he just couldn't get how we did things. So I went back until they found someone else. Some time later they called me back and asked me to come be a service writer. I worked in the service department for about 10 years. We had an agreement that I could come and go when I needed to. I liked it there. I had more interaction with the public. I like working with people. I finally retired about 5 years ago. Don: It worked out well for us. We could buy vehicles at cost. We've had more cars and pickups. We upgraded every couple of years so that when we did retire we would have some that would be good for retirement. TC: Tell us about your family. Wanda: We have 2 daughters who are both schoolteachers; each is married and has a son and daughter, so we have 4 grandchildren. One family lives in Columbia Falls, the other in Florence, Oregon. We have reasons to visit 2 beautiful areas of the country.

TC: tell us about your career, Don. Don: I am a general contractor, building houses and commercial buildings. I am not really retiring, but I am "slowing down." I planned and built our home. We've redone it a few times. Wanda: Yes, when our first daughter was getting married he decided to redo the kitchen. TC: During the wedding preparations? Wanda: Yes, we finished it about 2 days before the wedding. Before the second one got married he redid the front part of the house. It seems like when you own your home there are always things to fix, and to change. Don: When we built this house I was making about \$300.00 a month. Wanda wanted a bay window, but I just couldn't justify the expense for what you get out of a bay window.

What do you get? Just a couple of extra feet of room. So that never happened. **Wanda**: Don went to a trade show about windows, and came home with a magazine with a picture of windows across the front of the house. I loved it! So he said, "Wanda, I'll build you your bay window." And he built this addition. It has been lovely. We also put in the hardwood. **TC:** It is beautiful. We went out to the garage. His garage walls are lined with cupboards with doors made of ¾ inch plywood, which were window cutouts in a motel he built in Cutbank. These pieces of wood were just going to the trash, so instead he brought them home and was able to make them into these doors. The ceiling is also lined with this plywood. It looks so clean and organized. You can see some of them in the picture of the Mustang.

TC: How did you happen to join the SAACAC out of Lethbridge? Wanda: We joined the car club because of our friendship with Betty and Harold Olson. Betty and I have been really good friends for a long time. We enjoy the Circle Tours, and the International, and the people in the SAACAC. Don: It's the people. You know if you've seen one car you've seen them all. But they are such great people. And we share interests in common. It has been great fun for us to belong to the club.

Lately there hasn't been much opportunity to put them on display. Last year I drove the trailer loaded with the tractors in the Conrad parade. There is also a shop in this hanger where I am restoring another tractor.

Don: We needed a car to drive to rallies and tours so I came across this 1966 Mustang, which I got for payment for some work I did for a lady. It was in pretty good shape. I replaced the seats and the door panels. I got them from Mustang California. This car has been almost everywhere in Canada.

TC: What other hobbies do you have: Wanda: We like to travel. We have a 5th wheel trailer. We have been in every state in the union. We pulled the trailer to Alaska and were gone for 6 weeks. It was really rewarding. We had been warned about black flies

I am restoring a tractor for my other grandson.

A True Early Barn Find – The Hermit's Stanley Steamer

The RCMP found over 2000 dead crows on Alberta highways recently, and there was concern that they may have died from Avian Flu. Rhubarb Meringue Pie

1 cup sugar

2 tbsp flour

2 egg yolks

1 ½ cups rhubarb (cut fine)

2 tbsp butter

1 unbaked pie shell

Mix and sift sugar, flour and salt. Add the well-beaten egg yolks. Mix well with the rhubarb. Turn into unbaked pie shell and dot with the butter. Bake in a hot oven (425) for 10 minutes, then reduce heat to 350 and continue to bake for 30 minutes. Cover with meringue and brown in slow oven (325).

Meringue

2 egg whites

4 tbsp sugar

1/8 tsp salt

½ tsp vanilla

Beat the egg whites stiff. Then add the sugar gradually and continue to beat until mixture stands in peaks. Add salt and vanilla. Beat back to peaks. Spread roughly over pie. Brown in slow oven (325)

2 pounds ground beef 4 cans baked beans 8 hotdogs – sliced 1 chopped onion ½ cup barbeque sauce ½ cup grated cheese In a Dutch oven, cook the hamburger over medium heat until it is no longer pink. Drain off fat. Stir in the remaining ingredients, except cheese. Bring to a boil, then reduce heat. Sprinkle chees on top, then blend it in, a little at a time.
