Of course the main tour will be up the hill to Virginia City and we urge everyone to make sure their vehicles have been checked over and are ready to go.....and maybe more importantly.....to stop!

On Saturday night at the banquet, we have been promised a short presentation by Ward Thompson who lives in nearby McAllister. Ward in the past years has been the main mechanic on one of the Hemmings Great American Race cars. He has decided to take this year off and will be home for the Spring Tour and we are lucky he will. He has a wealth of rich tales about the storied race he can share with us. During the Tour Ward has also promised to bring out his very special 1935 Boat Tailed Auburn roadster. Now won't that

be a treat.

BAAC will also have a silent raffle (at least that is what I call it) with some really interesting items up for selection. Many members came across the hill to the Livingston Wheels Motoring Club's (LWMC) annual Windbreaker Swap Meet. The vendor numbers were down this year and so was the buyer traffic which brings me to several observations. There was a letter in the recent Hemmings Classic Car magazine that spoke to the same thing at Hershey. Swap meet attendance has been down all over the country and so are the vendor parts. Let's face it, original parts are drying up and the hobbyists are getting older with much less recruitment of the young into the ranks of the old car hobby with many more

leaving the ranks permanently. It is literally a dying hobby! If you haven't, maybe it is time to think about your classic cars and what will become of them in the future. Enough on that sad subject.

In the winter projects department, Larry Bode continues to put a 440 cubic inch engine together for his recently acquired 1966 Plymouth Sports Fury convertible. As mentioned before, this car is rather rare because it is a factory four speed behind the 440! In my garage, I have been working on a 1949 Nash 600 Brougham (Nash talk for a 2 door sedan). What makes this Nash a bit different is the rear seat configuration. Instead of a bench seat, the rear seat is a pair of bucket-types with a triangular arm in between complete with a cigarette lighter and ash tray. The 1949 Nash 600 had a smallish 170 cubic inch flathead six capable of 30 miles per gallon with overdrive and a 20 gallon tank, ie. 30 mpg x 20 gallons = 600 miles thus the model 600. In 1950 the "600" name was replaced with the "Statesman" which carried on in the short wheel base Nash. My intentions are to see that the Nash comes out of the garage in a running condition by summer's end.

Although many designers want to take credit for the invention of the little black dress, honors go to Gabrielle "Coco" Chanel, who introduced it in the May 1926 issue of American Vogue. It was compared to "Ford's shiny black standardized motor car. Both were sleek and intended to be available for the masses. The little black dress was set to 'become the sort of uniform for all women of taste.'"

1930s: Cut on the bias in satin or crepe, its slender and sleek silhouette drapes Jean Harlowe.

1940s: The hemline gets shorter, shoulders grow bigger, it's draped in fox fur and topped with cocktail hats. Threequarter length sleeves are complemented by long gloves. Think Joan Crawford and Bette Davis.

1950s: The LBD is longer and fuller, with layers of taffeta and stiff petticoats; it is slim, trim, and shorter when cut as a sheath dress; or loose and chemise-like, a popular design of the late 1950s known as the "sack" dress. (Doris Day in Pillow Talk (1959) or Jack Lemmon masquerading as a woman in Some Like It Hot (1959).)



1960s: The LBD establishes itself as a fashion icon. Audrey Hepburn as Holly Golightly in a Hubert de Givenchy, accessorized with a cup of coffee and danish, a long black cigarette holder, a martini, a heavy pearl choker, long gloves and a tiara. A strapless number worn by Anita Ekberg in Fellini's La Dolce Vita. In Sweet Charity (1969), Shirley MacLaine flaunts it with a belt, a top hat, and a tattoo.

The Panama is another legendary vintage find. Made popular and presentable by Hollywood legends Gary Cooper and Clark Gable as well as by presidents Teddy Roosevelt and Franklin D. Roosevelt, the straw hat originated in fifteenth-century Ecuador, where it was carefully handcrafted from fine toquilla straw fashioned from the latanier palm trees grown in the province of Manabis. The hat was then sold in Panamanian ports (thus the name). Seductive and classic, the Panama is also considered an artwork, as it can sometimes take up to a year to weave a single one. Don't be surprised if the price for a used Panama is a bit steeper than you might have expected. A brand new one can cost as much as \$10,000!



Romanoff, played by Sarah Bernhardt (who, in real life, was notorious for dressing like a man). In the 1920s, the silver screen popularized the hat for men, with such legends as Clark Gable, Humphrey Bogart, and Maurice Chevalier leading the way in fashion. I have another book from the same source that covers 50 years of Popular Mechanics how to hints, for cars, motorcycle and bicycles covering everything from how to substitute rope for inner tubes in bicycle to uses for old oil. They make for interesting reading to replace reality shows on TV. Kind of makes our new cars with, stereo, AC, power steering, GPS, electronic ignition kind of boring.

There is some talk about the upcoming spring and fall tours, the swap meet here and one in Livingston, as well as car shows here and there but nothing new to report.
