
pay the \$16.50 as a single. My thought was just pay the regular dues. No action was taken.

Another member asked me for more info on New Zealand, so I will add just a little. We went with Phil and Deloree Haglund, also Skunk Wagon members. There were no animals on the roads, but lot fenced in, including the European Red Deer, which look like elk with even more massive horns. Venison seems to be very popular. We always like history, and one guide told us the story of a man with a sheepdog but no sheep. However, every fall he would turn the dog loose and it would go off and come back with 2000 sheep. It took a couple of years for the police to catch on, and they threw the owner in jail and shot the dog. The exchange rate was about .70, and we were told not to tip. A taxi driver actually gave me back her \$5 tip with the admonition that no one tips in New Zealand. Meals were great but they always serve barely cooked bacon, and my coffee was what they call a "Long Black" but while it was black, it was not very long as they just fill the bottom half of a small cup, and expect you to dilute it with milk. All for about \$4 at McDonald's, and no refills.

I thought I would be questioned about the Chrysler "265 Hemis"

that we saw. Turns out this was a Mopar marketing ploy, and the engines were Slant Sixes. They seem to import many old cars from the US or Europe, so those have left hand drive. Depending on age, all cars are inspected once or twice each year. The roads are narrow with one lane bridges, and we crossed one that included a railroad track. Traffic was heavier on the North Island. but way less on the south. A big issue is foreign tourists who don't drive at home then come to NZ and rent motorhomes and try to maneuver them around tight corners. Scary.

I had an interesting question from the Ft. Benton research center. They had a photo of an early car in front of the blockhouse at the fort, and wondered what it was. Using the Model T forum, contributors thought Cadillac, Oldsmobile, REO, and finally, Gale, a car made for some years in Galesburg, Ill. 
some years ago, and discovered a plaque on it that stated "Winner, 1962 Montana 500" and I believe the car was driven by Leroy Schelly.


