



The cost to the members to be a member of the State Club is \$20.00 for couples and 16.50 for singles. These numbers plus the \$5.00 we get for FPAC Chapter Dues add up to the \$25.00 we ask for Couples and the \$21.50 we ask for Singles.

For your membership in the State Club, you get the Roster of State Club members, the quarterly State Club Magazine (the TIMES) which has news of all the Chapters plus State Tour and Swap Meet information, as well as the insurance coverage the State Club purchases for Individuals and Chapter and State "activities and events". If you aren't a State Club member, you can participate as a guest if you ride with someone who is a State Club member, but you can't drive vour own vehicle on our Tours.

Summers are becoming increasingly busy and while we try to schedule events, there is more going on than most of us can attend.. There are several State tours as well as the International Tour in Saskatoon along with many day events. I have been trying to attend the all original car show in Billings for many years, and this year it is coupled with a national Model T tour so I may finally make that. We are all so busy it is hard to attend everything.

Several members are planning to attend the auctions in Arizona in January and those are always quite a spectacle. Even if you are not buying a vehicle you can spend days just looking at the cars. For anyone near the Phoenix area, a great stop is at Ernie's Dwarf Car Museum west of Maricopa. The way Ernie replicates his cars in 11/16 scale is truly amazing.

Chuck Walsh acquired a 1925 Model T frame, axles, and miscellaneous body parts and is building an electrically powered Model T. He has quite a bit of experience as he has converted several other cars including a Chevrolet Luv and a Volkswagen Beetle. On the outside, it will look like a stock Ford but will not leak oil, vibrate, or wake up the neighbors. I think he should call it a Model E.

Bruce Bull just got his 1953 Kaiser Manhattan back from the paint shop and is putting it back together. These cars are very unique and were designed by Dutch Darrin. They were powered by a 226 CI "Supersonic" six cylinder but were not quite as fast as Chuck Yeager's X-1 rocket of the same era. Bruce also bought up one lot of Chang Jiang motorcycle parts and has about enough to build one bike with lots of parts left over. The Chang Jiang is a Chinese carbon copy of a late 30's BMW and I think that some parts are interchangeable. There were many copies of the early BMWs made not only by the Chinese but the Japanese as well and the Ural is a Russian version built yet today and available in the US. . Even Harley Davidson made a military bike, ala BMW, with a boxer engine and shaft drive, but only about 1000 of those were made. The Miracle of America Museum in Polson has the only one I have ever seen.

In 2010 while on a MPCAC tour in Butte, Bill Caffyn heard of an Edsel for sale nearby in Sheridan, Montana. He went to look at it and it turned out to be a 1958 Ranger 2 door hardtop

with a large V-8 and rare standard transmission. He bought it then and was driving it some last summer. He says this is the smoothest car he has ridden in and it is always good to see different cars out and about.

John Rummel spotted a tractor attachment for a Model T Ford and while that one was not available, it piqued his interest and he would like to build one. These were made by various manufacturers and consisted of large metal lugged rear wheels which were either gear of chain driven. I cannot imagine how these actually worked as even though they were very low geared, they were still Model T Fords. However, John has a donor car and he would like to put one together if anyone knows of a conversion that is available.

Now it is time to get back to the shop for winter work. My garage holds too many projects and not enough time, so some projects will hold over until next season.

This was our second tour of this private collection in the past four years. 
