The May dinner meeting was held at the Longbranch Cafe in



All you have is your personal automobile policy for Liability and damage to the car itself (Comprehensive, Collision, etc.).

We aren't totally sure what the State Club would like us to do about this, but our guess is that we will need to discuss it at a meeting and take a vote of the membership the results of which we will send to the State Club.
