Most of the members were surprised and a few dismayed at the higher Dues Rates brought about by the State Club's boosting the "Singles" rate to \$25.00 and the "Doubles" rate to \$30.00. Our Chapter Dues of \$5.00 per membership made the total dues \$30.00 for Singles (was \$21.50) and \$35 for Doubles (was \$25.00).

At about 9:15 AM the line opened for Breakfast (Eggs, Ham, Bacon, French Toast, Potatoes, Salsa, Juice) and everyone jumped at the opportunity. President Merry Nelson opened the meeting at 9:45, drawing our attention to the fact that we traditionally have our election of new Officers at the Breakfast. After some discussion, Nominations were requested for all offices, but none were offered in competition with existing officers, and cur-

rent office holders were all reelected for next year. They are as follows:

President: Merry Nelson; Vice President: Chuck Covey; Secretary: Dave Cooley; Treasurer: Bob Smith.

We have long been unsure about exactly who is covered and what the legendary "Insurance Policy" does really cover us for. Chuck Vernon suggested at the meeting that we contact the Insurance Company for valid information about the Policy. We did that, and it turns out that the coverage is indeed good and would cover the Chapter and its members for liabilities over and above the coverage we all have as individual car owners. We decided it would be worthwhile to include our newly found information about the State Club's Insurance policy in this

This Policy looks pretty complete as far as our Chapter (FPAC) is concerned, covering Members in circumstances in which we are active.

It was a relatively mild (45 degree) overcast day at 2:00 PM on Sunday November 3rd when 18 members and no guests gathered at the Flathead Valley Bridge Club building in Kalispell for our November meeting. After some discussion of the State Club's Insurance Policy, the next item of Business had to do with our dismay in view of the recent raise in Dues, and our belief that the State Club is not spending its (our) money efficiently when it comes to the services it provides. We decided to draft a letter for signature by our Chapter's Officers and Directors to be sent to the State Club and other Chapters with suggestions how to save enough money that the Dues would not have to be raised. The letter will be discussed and finalized at our January Meeting and sent out soon thereafter.

In Summary, with the high price of printing and distributing the MPCAC "TIMES" and the Roster. the old State Club Dues schedule of \$20.00 for Couples and \$16.50 for Singles, were not enough money to print and distribute the TIMES and the Roster, and that is why the State Club wanted to raise the Dues to \$30 for Couples and \$25 for Singles. Looking at the numbers, if the Club would put the two publications online the old Dues Schedule would be ample - and would easily result in a surplus. The Roster would be much more useful in that the Members could run a "Sort" and find out in an instant who in the State had a particular type of car (1947 Plymouth?), or Model Car (Model T or Corvette??) rather than having to plod through the entire printed Roster, one member at a time. The recent increase in Dues would be totally unnecessary. More details on what we are doing will be available after our January Meeting.

Another subject that was discussed is the practice of Judging the Cars on our State Tours if for no other reason than that most of our judges aren't qualified to judge all of the variety of cars that show up for judgement. Why not leave the Car Judging to Hershey or the Single Make and Single Model Tours? The Great Falls Club, Hosts for the Spring 2020 Tour, has been trying to drop the Judging in their Tour, and they

have had a lot of resistance from the State Club. Awards like "People's Choice", "Hard Luck", "Farthest Driven", "Youngest Driver", "Period Costume", etc. seem better suited to our Tours.

It was a chilly but not cold winter evening with no precipitation, at 4:00 PM when 24 Club Members and guests gathered at Loula's Restaurant in the old (1915) Bank Building in Whitefish for our annual Holiday Dinner. Chuck Covey's wife, Mary Lou, who owns the Restaurant, had agreed to open and do our Dinner, and it was excellent. 
