




Pizza, near Four Corners.

ard, Peerless, and Pierce Arrow, were all fighting the effects of the Depression, and, along with its large 8 and 12-cylinder machines, Packard introduced the 120, a less expensive but still 8 cylinder auto and that model saved Packard at the time. While Lincoln and Cadillac offered less expensive versions, they were renamed Zephyr and LaSalle. Many felt that calling the new Packard a Packard cheapened the brand and led to Packard's demise in the 50s, but the days of the independents was over by then. My great uncle purchased his 1935 120 in New Ulm, Minnesota, and I bought and drove the car to Billings in 1968, and still have it. Interestingly, the 120s had features, such as insert bearings and independent front suspension, not offered on senior Packards until later.

In 1907 Glenn Curtiss set an unofficial speed record of 137 mph on a V-8 powered, shaft driven motorcycle, a record which stood for several years. However, experts today are challenging that claim, stating that the speed was statistically not obtainable. The bike still exists at the Smithsonian and was part of my inspiration for building my own V-8, shaft-driven bike.

First, as previously reported, there was a fire caused by a car from another club. This caused the section that our six cars were in to be evacuated and closed for cleanup and repairs for two days. Some of our members went home but others drove their cars around to an unaffected part of the Mall where they re-entered and the show continued in the undamaged section. Fortunately, two of our members who re-entered (Doug Ruffato and Dave McIntosh) had their cars voted as in the top ten of the show. The best news that we have heard is that despite the fire in their Mall, the owners do not wish to discontinue the longstanding tradition of a large indoor Missoula Mall Car Show. A September date has been scheduled for a new show to make up for the partially aborted one in April 2021 and in 2022 the annual show will continue, probably in April as before.

I apologize for what is coming next, but as

there is not much to report on at this time of the year I am going to fill this extra space with some unadulterated trivia. It's about what is probably the least understood and least appreciated part of the Early Ford V-8 (EFV8) ignition system: the ignition resister. This little 20 cent part (in 1932) fits under the dashboard on the firewall and no EFV8 will run for long without it. The EFV8 coils were designed to run on 3.5 volts and this resister in the primary circuit cuts the voltage from 6 volts to 3.5 volts. Also, as the resister heats and cools it changes its resistance and ingeniously regulates the primary current to the coil so it has just what it needs at all engine speeds. This same little part was used in every EFV8 car from 1932 through 1948. A similar but different part was used from 1949 through 1953 when Ford stopped making the flathead EFV8's. Very little was ever mentioned about this part in Ford books or service manuals, I wonder why Ford did not just use a 6 volt coil?
