

Summer Tour Board of Directors Meeting

Great Falls, Montana

The meeting was called to order by President Dan Costle at 7:20 p.m. The roll call of clubs was taken with 13 directors present, 4 officers present, along with Fashion Consultant Kathy Meuchel.

New Secretary Bill Caffyn read the minutes of the Board of Directors meeting and the General Business meeting from the September 2019 Fall Tour in Anaconda. The minutes were approved as read. Treasurer Mary Seelmeyer had no treasurer's report at this time.

President Dan thanked the Great Falls Skunk Wagon Chapter for hosting the 2021 tour after the lost year of 2020 due to Covid.

Old Business: The 2022 tours will be held in Missoula in the Spring and Billings in the Fall. Doug Winz brought up that one club (Flathead) has opted out of hosting any more tours due to aging and declining membership. It was mentioned that the Hi-Line club has done the same. Dan read the letter that was sent from the Flathead club explaining their reasons. Mary Seelmeyer mentioned that the average age of our membership is getting older with very few younger members coming in. The question was asked what advantages are there for a chapter to belong to the State club. The answer is insurance, which, fortunately, has never needed to be used. Sue smith recommended that we consider going to one tour per year instead of two. Dick Babcock noted that changing to one tour would need a revision to be made in the By-laws and Green Book in order to happen. Secretary Bill will send a letter to each of the chapters asking them to discuss this at their next meetings and vote whether they want one or two tours per year.

Jeff Stevens asked if there had been a date set for the Fall 2022 tour in Billings. There has not. He is asking this because he is involved with the planning of a National Tour, to be held in Missoula next September by another car club, and doesn't want a conflict of dates causing their members to have to decide which tour to attend. Mary said she is going to be traveling to Billings in about two weeks and will ask Roger Thomsen if their club has set a date yet.

Doug Winz asked about the Installation Dinner, usually held the last weekend in April at the Skunk Wagon Swap Meet in Great Falls, what will happen if we go to only one tour per year? We need to have at least two meetings each year, and the Swap Meet in Great Falls is no more.

Kurt Baltrusch asked about the Green Book: Is it a guideline or hard and fast rules? He also asked how the Green Book can be changed. Bill Meuchel suggested that each club go over the Green Book to see what they feel could be changed/updated, since it hasn't been revised since 2013. Discussion followed. President Dan asked for volunteers for a committee to discuss revising the Green Book. Kurt Baltrusch, Bill Meuchel, Charles Vernon and Jamie Costle volunteered. They were asked to meet sometime between now and the Spring Board Meeting in Missoula and report back at that tour.

Dan asked Mary about a new Roster. She said hopefully it will be ready by January 2022. Each club treasurer needs to get any changes and updates to Mary as soon as possible.

Dan brought up the fact that he has been President for longer than normal because of the Covid crisis

and it was about time to move on. He also informed us that Fritz Seitz has resigned as Vice-President due to health issues. Dan said he would be willing to continue as President until the next election of officers. A Nominating Committee was asked for. Betty Olson, Doug Winz and Bill Meuchel volunteered. Joann Hosko moved that we keep the current officers, Kathy Meuchel seconded the motion. All agreed. Doug Winz was asked, and he accepted, being Vice-President until the next election of officers. Fritz was thanked by all present for his service the past two years as Vice-President.

The Missoula club was asked if they had any report on the 2022 Spring Tour. They did not.

Doug Winz asked about the number of judges that volunteered for car judging Saturday morning. Secretary Bill read the names of the 10 that said "yes" on their registration forms to being a judge, along with the two who wanted to have their cars judged. One more member volunteered to have her car judged also. The judges will meet tomorrow morning at 8:00 a.m. Kathleen Vernon mentioned that the judges will meet in the parking area behind the Heritage Inn for breakfast, a short meeting, and the judging will be held there also.

Bill Meuchel moved the meeting be adjourned, at 8:06 p.m.

Summer Tour General Board Meeting


Great Falls, Montana

But that is another story for another time. Being new, for the second time, President Karin Ludeman awarded Wendell an official BAAC ball cap and BAAC cookbook.

No light weight either, tipping the scales at 3965 pounds.



py trails and adventures. Be safe and have a good spring.












Flathead Pioneer Auto Club

In 2009, many inactive old car titles were purged and between 2014 and as late as February, the State has said that purged titles were invalid and that owners would have to go through the Break/Bond process to get these titles reinstated. However, the State has now shifted its position, and these titles can be reinserted or transferred via the usual process. However, owners must have a state issued title. not a copy. You can find if your title is valid by calling your local office with your title number. If they have no record, you can then take them the title and they should be able to reinsert it. Again, this applies only to older autos with titles that have been inactive for a long time. For instance, both my Model T and my Packard were last titled in 1970 and the Packard title is still valid, while

the Model T title was not. Call or email me if you have questions, and the best bet is to work patiently with the title people. I have always had good luck with them.

The responses for the Great Falls Swap Meet have been great! The meet is April 29-30 and is sponsored by Great Falls area car clubs. All indoor spaces have been reserved; however, vendors may still reserve outside spaces for \$10 (before April 20th), or may be put on a waiting list for indoor spaces in case of cancellations. Missoula Hellgate Auto Club

Planning is in progress for what we hope will be an interesting time featuring attractions at historic Fort Missoula, established in 1877. These attractions will include a live steam powered sawmill demonstration and also the 125th anniversary of the Army's 25th Infantry Regiment known as the "Buffalo Soldiers". We have all seen movies and read books about the "Buffalo Soldiers" and the Indian Wars but many don't know about this Black regiment that was attached to Fort Missoula 125 years ago training and experimenting with the use of bicycles in military operations. We hope to see re-enactments and hear talks about the Regiment, especially their 1,900 bicycle trip to St. Louis in 1997. This event is attracting national attention and for a preview google ironriders2022. org. Be sure and see more Spring Tour details and the registration form in this issue of the Times.

Regretfully, we must report that this spring we lost one of our oldest and most iconic club members—J Nelson. Anyone who has ever attended the Great Falls Swap Meet, or probably most any swap meet between Great Falls and Spokane has likely seen J. Swap meets were his passion both as a buyer or seller. He also had a varied collection of nice old cars and parts.

We have recently learned that the Missoula (Southgate) Mall will again host the annual indoor mall car show on April 23 and 24. A report on this event will be in the next (July) Times.

As is the usual case for the Hellgate Club's April Report there has not been a lot going on over the winter months and therefore not a lot of news to report. So as in previous April reports this space is filled with a bit of unadulterated trivia. This time it is about the Whitworth thread, a subject familiar to old English car buffs. Prior to WWII England and America had their own thread systems and got along just fine with our SAE standards and their Whitworth standards. During WWII problems came to

light such as installing an English Rolls Royce engine into an American P51 airplane. After the end of WWII both countries agreed upon a unified standard: Unified National Course (UNC) and Unified National Fine (UNF). Actually the new unified standard was for all practical purposes the same as America's SAE standard meaning the old Whitworth nuts and bolts were history. The English have since given up the UNF and UNC standards in favor of the metric system leaving the USA as the only country in the world still using the inch (UNF/UNC) standards. English cars prior to WWII were all Whitworth so a special set of spanners (wrenches) were required. However, post WWII cars, with few exceptions, were all unified standards. One reason England gave up Whitworth for American unified standards was that they wanted and got a large market in the USA for cars. Most post war English car buffs can occasionally spot a Whitworth nut or bolt on an accessory or trim piece but not on important items such as engine or chassis. It is

possible but also a no no to interchange Whitworth with UNF or UNC (SAE) nuts and bolts as they don't fit very well, come loose and or fail easily. Whitworth spanners are marked for the diameter of bolt they fit, not the distance between the flats on the bolt head

or nut as on American wrenches. So for who are still reading, that is the last bit of trivia you will see here until April of 2023.
