






Vintage d' Fenders


Our meetings during the winter





The Toledo, Ohio built Overlands were large vehicles and targeted for the well heeled New York type crowds and were not inexpensive. They sold for about \$3K when a Ford Model T was \$275! Bill even has an Overland catalog

that describes various enhancements that could be added, like a rear facing seat.

They also own a 1943 Willys war-type Jeep. The Willys Overland Company went all-in for the war effort in producing vehicles needed. Henry Ford did contribute, but did so only after being ordered by the US Government. He mainly taught the setting up of assembly lines, most notably in the production of aircraft. The Ottos also own a 1950 GMC 6 x 6 truck as well as an assortment of 1960s and 1970s John Deere log skidders, backhoes, and roadgraders. Among them are three 1941 Dodge Command Cars and a 1941 Dodge ambulance. Bill says they are mostly parts cars, but there is enough there to put one Command Car together, if someone wanted too. So welcome to the Ottos.


Central Montana Trail Dusters




Members gathered in Roy, Mont. for dinner at the Legion Bar.




guys for saving the old tractors.



This may be the last report from me about the Goggles and Dusters Club. Our club has suffered from a decline






Mercury lineup





We hope you all can make the Spring Tour here in Kalispell, we look forward to seeing you there.


